



11TH GRADE COLLEGE PREP CHECKLIST

Take advantage of all of the opportunities offered as you continue to move through high school and consistently meet with your school representative to ensure your goals are met.

Use this checklist to help get prepared. As you cross off tasks on your list, Our Dakota Dreams will be by your side every step of the way.

FALL SEMESTER:

- Start strategically Talk with your school counselor about your options and plans for life after high school. This will help you take advantage of opportunities to prepare over the next two years.
- Inquire about test dates for the PSAT, ACT, and/or SAT You will need to register up to six weeks ahead of time.
 - Find **<u>ACT</u>** and **<u>SAT</u>** test dates and register up to six weeks ahead!
 - Explore **<u>ACT prep</u>** and/or **<u>SAT prep</u>** courses or investigate self-guided study plans.
 - Consider whether you'd like to take the **PSAT** in October. A high score on the PSAT could qualify you for the National Merit Scholarship Program.
- Attend **college fairs** to learn as much as you can about the colleges that interest you.
- Begin planning college visits. These visits are a great way to get a feel for the schools fall and winter break are good times to go!
- Sign up for extracurricular activities to gain new skills, make friends, and boost your resume for scholarship and college applications.
- Sign up for the spring courses that could save you time and money in college. A tougher course load could pay off with scholarships and help you get admitted to the college of your choice.
 - Qualify for the <u>South Dakota Opportunity Scholarship</u> by taking the right coursework.
 - Take some <u>dual credit classes</u> in the spring semester to begin to earn college credits now.

SPRING SEMESTER:

- Sign up for the ACT and/or SAT, if you haven't already.
- Take the ACT in February.
- Attend **college fairs** to learn as much as you can about the college(s) of your interest.
- Develop your senior schedule and organize your individual graduation plan. Make sure you're on track by reviewing your high school curriculum requirements. Talk to a school counselor if you have questions.
 - Qualify for the <u>South Dakota Opportunity Scholarship</u> by taking the right coursework your senior year.
 - Consider taking some **dual credit classes** your senior year to begin to earn college credits, saving you time and money in the long run.
 - Consider taking the <u>Year-Long College Algebra Course</u> your senior year. You will earn three college algebra credits by completing this year-long course. (The fall portion focuses on college algebra preparation, while the second semester is a dual credit college algebra course.) Talk to your school counselor to see if this course is right for you!
- Plan more campus visits for spring break Check to see if any colleges offer an overnight visit.
 These can help you get a good feel for the school.
- Work hard in your state assessments Your assessment scores may come in handy with college admissions!
- Participate in <u>South Dakota's Week of Work</u> to explore, experience, and engage in work-based learning opportunities!
- Decide if you should take Advanced Placement exams in May Talk it through with your school counselor.
- Explore summer job or internship opportunities.
- Contact SD Department of Labor & Regulation and ask about the Work Experience program through the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). If qualified, you could be eligible for a paid internship while building your resume, <u>sdjobs.org.</u>

SUMMER:

- Take the ACT and/or SAT, if you haven't already.
- Explore **colleges and academic programs** that align with your interests.

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR:

- Organize your **personal learning plan** Work with your school counselor to meet all your goals.
- Keep exploring your career interests and related college programs.
- Attend open houses and learn as much as you can about colleges you are interested in.
- Visit with the admissions representatives who come to your high school.
- Write a resume Your teachers and school counselor can help!
- Familiarize yourself with **<u>college application requirements</u>** when applications are due, if they require essays, or recommendations? Create a strategy.
- Start investigating private and public sources for <u>financial aid</u> Take note of scholarship deadlines and plan ahead.
- Watch the **Paying for College SD** video series and invite your parents to do the same.



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
