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FAST TRACK ADMISSION



Fast Track Admission COMING SOON!

Fast Track Admission is a new pilot program in South Dakota that lets high school seniors bypass the college application process for participating universities based on their academic achievements.

PARTICIPATING UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES:

Black Hills State University, Main Campus – Spearfish

Black Hills State University – Rapid City

Northern State University – Aberdeen

South Dakota State University – Brookings

University of South Dakota, Main Campus – Vermillion

University of South Dakota – Sioux Falls

This is a three-year pilot starting in 2024-2025 that includes students in select school districts, including those in Sioux Falls, Aberdeen, and Spearfish. Participation is expected to expand in future years.

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FREE COLLEGE APPLICATION PERIOD

Free College Application Period

OCTOBER 1 THROUGH NOVEMBER 30

All students will have a risk-free, no-cost chance to check out and apply to nearly all public post-secondary schools in South Dakota.

During the free application period, students may apply to as many South Dakota public colleges and universities as they wish.

FAFSA Completion

Students who complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) are statistically more likely to apply to, attend and graduate from college, but millions of dollars are “left on the table” each year because students do not complete it.



FAFSA Completion

Schedule a Financial Aid Night

Schedule a Financial Aid Event for your parents and students to help them prepare to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). You can choose to invite your families to the school to view the presentation in-person or you can host the presentation online.

1. Determine possible dates for your financial aid night.
2. Contact [Mapping Your Future](#) (or a college financial aid office directly) to discuss your plans and to gather more information about event support.
3. Promote the event to parents and students.
4. Test the technology, especially if you are hosting an online event.
5. Have a moderator available. In most events, the counselor will serve as the moderator. This ensures that all questions are heard, and the event runs smoothly.

- Provides information about the Completion status of their high school seniors as either **COMPLETE, NOT FILED**, or **INCOMPLETE**
- The portal can provide an indicator showing if the students have been chosen for verification as well as month and date of birth.
- Knowing the completion status of your seniors helps you determine who you need to spend additional time with to ensure FAFSA awareness and support the application process.

Membership will require school district superintendents to sign data-sharing agreements before school representatives have access to the FAFSA Completion Portal.

NOTE:

Financial information is not available on the FAFSA Completion Portal, and representatives cannot see to what school(s) a student submitted their FAFSA.

All schools must complete the agreement to have access to the portal.

Private schools will also need to provide student roster information in addition to the agreement.

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HIGH SCHOOL DUAL ENROLLMENT

Dual Enrollment

High School Dual Credit

Through the High School Dual Credit (HSDC) program, current high school juniors and seniors enrolled at public, private, and tribal high schools can enroll in college coursework at the **rate of \$50.84 per credit hour** (or $1/3$ of the total reduced credit hour rate). The State of South Dakota pays the remaining tuition costs.

Concurrent Credit

Concurrent Credit courses are dual credit courses offered at your high school. These courses are taught by a high school teacher who is qualified to teach college-level courses. These courses are offered at \$40 per credit hour. (Note: The Rising Scholar courses through NSU and BHSU are Concurrent Credit.)

Non-Degree Seeking

High school students taking university coursework at the full rate. This is often for students wanting to enroll in coursework that is not a BOR general education course or for students who do not qualify for HSDC. Students must obtain approval from their high school and courses.

Is Dual Credit Right for Me?



IS DUAL CREDIT THE RIGHT OPTION FOR ME?

We applaud your decision to consider enhancing your high school education and get a jump on your postsecondary career by taking dual credit. However, it is important you consider whether this approach is the best one for you. The following are some things you may want to consider as you contemplate your decision.

STUDENT READINESS

Dual credit is a great fit for most students who show interest, maturity, and academic readiness, but it may not be a perfect fit for every student.

Important factors to show student readiness for dual credit:

- Self-direction and motivation, as college-level courses require performance at the level of any other college student.
- Organizational, time management, and study skills.
- Self-discipline and motivation, especially for online dual credit courses.
- Reading and writing skills.
- Strong computer/technology experience, especially for online dual credit courses.

IMPACT ON STUDENT RECORD

It's important to understand that dual credit courses impact not just the high school transcript but also the college transcript.

Factors to consider with the student record and dual credit:

- Grades earned become part of both the student's permanent high school and postsecondary GPA.
- Poor performance in dual credit courses can impact the continued participation in the dual credit program and the student's postsecondary careers. This may include college admissions, scholarship opportunities, academic standing, and financial aid eligibility.
- If students are struggling, encourage them to communicate with the course instructor and seek out academic support services. Early action on the student's part can help them get on track and be successful.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- Students taking on-campus or online courses may be exposed to discussions, readings, and visual material at the college level and will be expected to adhere to the same performance standards as any other college student as set forth in course outlines and syllabi.
- Dual Credit students are treated no differently than any other college-level student.
- Students should be prepared to do most of their learning on their own.
- Help students learn by modeling the message that their academic success depends on them taking responsibility for their own education and behavior.
- The general rule is that for every hour spent in class, college students should spend 2-3 hours out of class reading, studying, and completing assignments. Students enrolling in online courses should plan for 10-15 hours per week for each course.
- By participating in the high school dual credit program, students give consent for the postsecondary institutions to disclose academic information, including, but not limited to, academic standing, progress, and grades to their high school.

If you're looking to graduate college faster, it's a good idea to focus on taking only the HSDC courses that are necessary to complete your degree. High School Dual Enrollment

What is Dual Enrollment?

Dual enrollment is any college course taken by a high school student that counts for both high school and college credit. High school students applying to take courses prior to high school graduation will utilize this application. Several types of dual enrollment courses fall under this application, which are described below:

High School Dual Credit Program

Through the High School Dual Credit (HSDC) program, current high school juniors and seniors enrolled at public, private, and tribal high schools have the opportunity to enroll in college coursework at the rate of \$50.84 per credit hour (or 1/3 of the total reduced credit hour rate). The State of South Dakota pays the remaining tuition costs.

For students to participate in the program, their high schools must have a signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the South Dakota Department of Education ([see the list of high schools with an MOU here](#)).

All courses meet the System's General Education requirements at all six Regental institutions. They are taught by university faculty and offered face-to-face at BOR campuses and online. In some cases, high schools may also offer In-District HSDC courses taught by university faculty on-site at your high school.

Non-Degree Seeking Admission

In certain instances, high school students in grades 9-12 may wish to take courses from BOR universities at the full tuition rate (including applicable fees). This is known as non-degree seeking high school enrollment. Students must obtain approval from their high school to take courses under non-degree seeking admission, which would count for credit at the high school level as well. This may be an option for students in the situations described below:

- A student wanting to enroll in a course that is not eligible for the HSDC program (i.e. a course that is not part of the BOR General Education curriculum.)
- A student does not meet the criteria for the High School Dual Credit or Concurrent Credit Programs. Examples of this include:
 - Not meeting the academic requirements of the initial eligibility criteria,
 - Students in grades 9-10 (who are not eligible for the HSDC program), or
 - Students who do not reside in or attend school in South Dakota

Note: High school students are not registered for courses until roughly two weeks after the application opens, as high school students are not placed into courses until the registration period for traditional students closes. Students will be registered for courses in the order their applications are received.

CREATING THE PARENT ACCOUNT

- When your child completes their portion of the dual enrollment application, you will receive an email with the subject line "Parent/Guardian Consent for [Student Name] for High School Student Dual Enrollment Admissions." At the end of that email, there is a link to complete your section of the form. You will create a new account and complete the parent portion of the application.

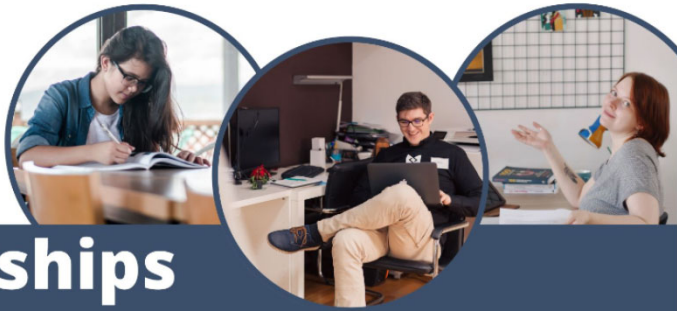

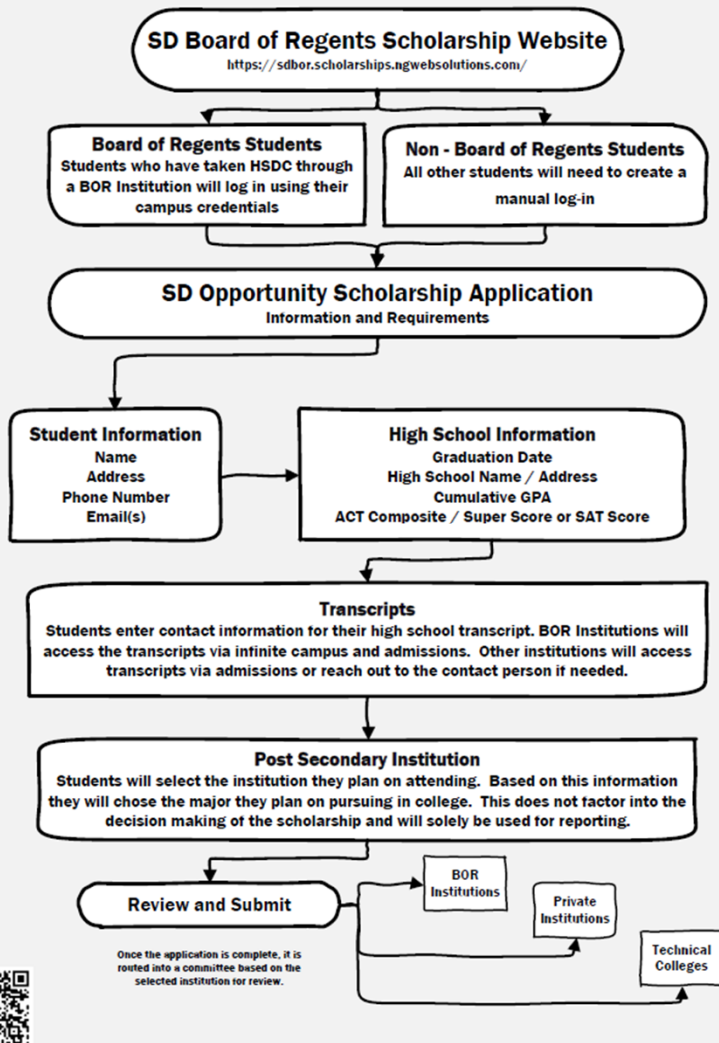

Jump Start Scholarship

\$1500 award to students who graduate from a public high school in three years or less

System Scholarships

Ardell Bjugstad – Native American student studying agriculture

Fowler Kaden – a first-time freshman at BHSU, DSU, NSU, SDSU, or USD who is pursuing elementary education

Scarborough Memorial – awarded to a student who is classified as a junior at a public university at the time of funding

Critical Teaching Needs Scholarship

This program encourages students in South Dakota to pursue a teaching degree in a high-need field and contribute to the state and its citizens by teaching in South Dakota. It is open to Juniors or Seniors in college.

Needs Based Scholarship

Students who have completed the FAFSA are eligible and may be selected by university financial aid institutions to determine awardees and scholarship amounts – no application

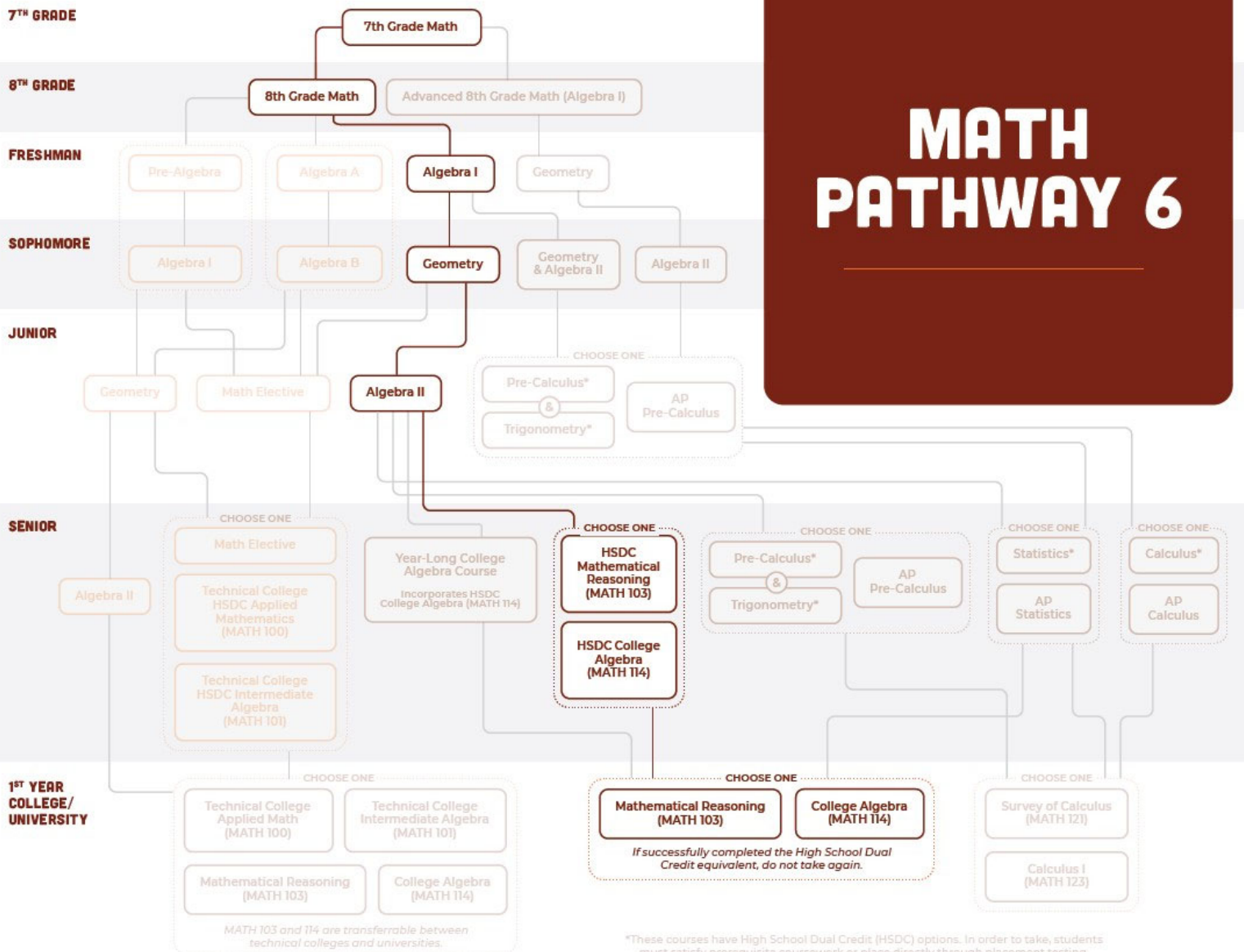
